knowing I am making a difference in the lives of the individuals I serve,



# Exec's Corner



A very atypical summer this year. Record high temps in May and drought conditions gave way to daily thunder storms and high humidity. Although not a perfect beach type summer, I am grateful for the long days and no ice to scrap or snow to shovel.

While the weather has been

unique, unfortunately some things stayed the same. Take the Governor's proposed budget for example. The Arc of Northeastern Pennsylvania joined the advocacy efforts of The Arc of Pennsylvania and PAR. We worked diligently as we spoke about the crisis in community services with legislators and the Governor. We believed we were heard. Families spoke out about their challenges and efforts to obtain needed supports for their loved one. We thought our message was clear and strong. But our hopes were dashed when the budget was announced with no increase in the Home and Community Services line item—yet again. The staffing crisis, they said, is a national problem and not something they can fix. But years of underfunding contributed to this crisis in Pennsylvania. The fix is the state of Pennsylvania, providers, families and self advocates working together to identify solutions.

Without adequate staff, providers have curtailed accepting referrals for service. Quality in service and safety for individuals served are of utmost importance, yet severely compromised without proper staff. By failing to provide increased rates of reimbursement that support competitive wages commensurate with responsibilities, the State of Pennsylvania has imposed limited options on families due to declining service options. Recently some families have had no choice but to resort to taking their family member to an emergency room, waiting days, often weeks to obtain appropriate services. This is not acceptable. Advocating for a good life in community is just as important now as anytime in The Arc's 67 year history. We will share the stories of families and their loved one's struggles. Our message is that important.

Thank you for being an Arc member and supporting our mission.

The Arc's staff is not responsible for the supervision of league members.





WHEREAS, direct support professionals are integral to the physical, mental, and emotional well-being of all individuals with intellectual, developmental, and other disabilities, regardless of their age; and

WHEREAS, direct support professionals build close, respectful, and trusted relationships with the individuals they serve; and

WHEREAS, the participation of direct support professionals in medical care planning is critical to the successful management of medical events, post-acute care, and long-term support and services; and

WHEREAS, the direct support professionals community encapsulates a multitude of professions, including but not limited to direct care workers, personal attendants, in-home support workers, and paraprofessionals, all of which share an equal role in providing long-term support and services for millions of individuals with disabilities; and

WHEREAS, direct support professionals have worked tirelessly to support individuals with disabilities, and their dedication will continue to make the Commonwealth an inclusive and safe place for all.

THEREFORE, I, Josh Shapiro, Governor of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, do hereby proclaim September 10-16, 2023, as
